

State of the Race 2024: House of Representatives

Although much of the political reporting and prognosticating in 2024 will focus on the presidential race, **it is important to remember that the 435 elections being held for seats in the House of Representatives are just as crucial.** For those of us who live in reliably blue states like California and New York, voting in the presidential election may seem relatively unimportant, but California and New York are also home to 9 of the 23 House races rated "toss-ups" by the Cook Political Report. Not only is retaining the presidency crucial for Democrats, regaining control of the House is also key to solidifying Democratic priorities in a second Biden term. Below is a summary of the current state of the battle for control of the House.

For background, the Democrats beat back a predicted "red wave" in the 2022 midterms, leaving Republicans with a slim majority. As a result, the

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Democrats need to flip only a handful of seats to win back the majority. Often the difference between winning and losing a congressional race is a matter of only a few hundred or a few thousand votes. The Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee estimated that as few as 6,675 total votes kept Democrats from retaining the majority in the House in 2022. This means that **relatively few changed votes could enable Democrats to retake the House**. Where might new Democratic seats come from?

Republican members in Biden districts : There are 18 GOP members of the House who won in districts that were carried by Biden in 2020. Democrats are focused on these seats as key opportunities for flipping. The Republican incumbents have not been helped by the extremist do-nothing agenda of the MAGA wing in the House, and Democrats will be pushing that message in their campaigns. (We also need to work on holding the five seats held by Democrats in districts that Trump won in 2020).

New Congressional maps: The combination of the pandemic-delayed census in 2020 and a heavy focus, particularly by Democrats, on litigation over gerrymandered maps has meant many members of Congress will be running in newly drawn districts. A lot of media attention was paid to the redistricting fight in Alabama, which resulted in a new map that makes it likely the Democrats will pick up an additional seat in this traditionally deep red state. A new map has also been drawn in Louisiana, giving Democrats a likely additional seat there, and a recent ruling in NY allows Democrats to redraw the map in that state which may result in as many as six more favorable districts. On the other hand, a new map in North Carolina, where the Republicans control a super-majority in the state house, may give Republicans a chance to take back three seats from the Democrats in 2024. Litigation and map-drawing fights continue in at least six other states that may have an impact on control of the House.

What all of this means for Democrats is that **we can't afford to sit on the sidelines, even in blue states.** Congressional candidates often suffer in presidential election years, whether from complacency or a lack of enthusiasm for the candidate at the top of the ticket. As much as the presidential race may come down to a get-out-the-vote effort, **get-out-thevote efforts will be even more important in congressional races** where only a handful of voters, in districts spread throughout the country—in red states as well as blue states—will have an outsized impact on which party controls Congress in the next term.

Update: One Seat Flipped

We're on our way! **Democrat Tom Suozzi has successfully won election** in NY-03, flipping the seat previously held by expelled and indicted Republican George Santos. Thanks to our members who participated in CGB phone banks organized by Licia Hurst and Larry Kahn over the last six weeks to support Suozzi's campaign.

Biden's Big Wins
